

Florence Lehmann — Cœur réfléchi tore 1996 Resin, Plexiglass, polished silver, mirror © Les Arts Décoratifs / Jean Tholance From 3 April to 10 November 2024, the Musée des Arts Décoratifs presents for the very first time a selection of haute couture and prêt-à-porter pieces, as well as jewellery and costume jewellery, within the permanent gallery spaces devoted to design from the 20th century until the present day. Thirty fashion designs and some one hundred jewellery pieces from designers and prestigious houses like Cartier, Van Cleef & Arpels, Christian Dior, Lanvin, and Balmain, rub shoulders with the big names in design such as Ettore Sottsass, Ron Arad, Phillipe Starck, and the Campana brothers. The exhibition is also an opportunity to display new acquisitions in these three areas.

The exhibition is curated by Marie-Sophie Carron de la Carrière, Chief Heritage Curator; Eric Pujalet-Plaà, Curator of Fashion and Textile Collections; Mathieu Rousset Perrier, Heritage Curator and Curator of the Medieval, Renaissance, and Jewellery Collections; Juliette Pollet, Heritage Curator; Dominique Forest, Head Curator, and Karine Lacquement, Curator of the Modern and Contemporary Collections, with the scenography design entrusted to Kevin Lebouvier.

A New Look at the National Collection of the Musée des Arts Décoratifs

The themed presentation extends over the five floors of the Pavillon de Marsan, offering visitors stunning views of the Tuileries Gardens and the Rue de Rivoli. It pays homage to celebrated jewellery houses and designers and highlights the collections of the great fashion houses or "maisons" located on the Place Vendôme, such as Cartier and Van Cleef & Arpels. It is also a tribute to the fertile imagination of creators and artists like Jean Desprès, Jean Schlumberger, Florence Lehmann, Costanza, and Roger Jean-Pierre, all of whom have demonstrated great creativity throughout their careers.








This unique exhibit showcases iconic pieces from the museum's fashion collections, devoting an important place to designers like Paco Rabanne, Issey Miyake, and Rick Owens. The large fashion houses are also well-represented: Olivier Rousteing for Balmain, John Galliano for Christian Dior, and Courrèges with its artistic director Nicolas de Felice. The exhibition allows visitors to take a new look at design from the post-war period to the present day, both French and international, arranged thematically from Nathalie du Pasquier to Martin Szekely, and from Jean Prouvé to Charlotte Perriand, via Michael Graves, Roger Tallon, and contemporaries Marc Newson and Pierre Charpin. It thus shines a light on the creative and historical links between the various disciplines that comprise the decorative arts.

Themes and variations

The exhibition opens with a luxuriously embroidered runway prototype, created by Olivier Rousteing for his first collection for Balmain, and a nod to Pierre Balmain's admiration for the American West. This metallic aesthetic resonates with the work of British designer Ron Arad or the Art Deco jewellery of Jean Desprès.

The evocation of elementary and geometric forms, which prevail in contemporary design, is also the opportunity to exhibit a Christian Dior haute couture creation by John Galliano, dating from 2004, representing an ancient Egyptian divinity. The piece is positioned opposite jewellery by Cartier, Van Cleef & Arpels, and Claude Chavent, with clean lines in precious metals.

An example of upcycling – which consists of recycling materials no longer in use – can be seen in the piece by Andrea Crews, with her design entering into a dialogue with contemporary jewellery by Verena Sieber-Fuchs and Lisa Walker.

Visitors are then invited to discover the impressive *Icon* dress, designed by couturier Stéphane Rolland in 2023. Sparkling and golden, inspired by Our Lady of Aparecida, the patron saint of Brazil, it sits alongside a wardrobe by the Campana brothers, which highlights the hybrid beauty of the baroque and the Latin ascetism of such works. Still focusing on design, the following rooms come alive with a dressing gown by artist Jean Dubuffet, whose motifs contrast with the pure lines and simplicity of creations by Charlotte Perriand and Jean Prouvé.

Typically devoted to design items, ceramics, and glass, for this exhibition, the modern and contemporary galleries are punctuated with different fashion creations and accessories adding a theatrical and narrative dimension to the permanent collections, as well as a new transdisciplinary and non-hierarchical reading of the works on display.

Design at the Musée des Arts Décoratifs

"What is design?" This was the title of a seminal exhibition, held at the Central Union of the Decorative Arts – the current-day museum – in 1969. Since that date, this question has continued to preoccupy the institution. "Is design an expression of art? Is design a craft for industrial purposes? Does design involve the creation of necessarily useful products?" were just some of the questions that Joe Colombo, Charles and Ray Eames, and Roger Tallon then agreed to answer.

These questions are still relevant and extend to other areas today: is the production of new artefacts compatible with the preservation of our environment and natural resources? How can we design objects that do not alienate their user or producer but instead offer them greater freedom?

Through its acquisitions of pieces relating to social and environmental design, its attention to digital technologies, and the way in which designers have revived artisanal practices, the collections at the Musée des Arts Décoratifs mirror the inflections and tensions of a field in constant redefinition.

The exhibition, one of the largest devoted to contemporary design in Europe, allows the public to discover essential designers, from Charlotte Perriand to Lalanne, as well as the latest, emerging generation. It also reflects the diversity of creative centres by showing a plural geography. The constant dialogue between design and artistic crafts is just another dimension that makes this exhibition so unique.
